DID YOU KNOW?

April – Quiz 5

- Franklin D. Roosevelt was the only U.S. president elected to four terms, leading the country through both the Great Depression and most of World War II.
- The American Civil War began at Fort Sumter and was the deadliest war in U.S. history, with more American lives lost than in all other wars combined.
- Fidel Castro transformed Cuba into the world's first communist state in the Western Hemisphere and survived over 600 assassination attempts during his rule.
- 4. Tony Martin's case sparked a national debate in the UK about the rights of homeowners to use deadly force in self-defense.
- The Oklahoma City bombing was carried out by Timothy McVeigh and remains the deadliest domestic terrorist attack on U.S. soil.
- David Koresh claimed to be the final prophet and led his followers during the Waco siege, which ended tragically after a 51-day standoff.
- Frankie Howerd was a master of innuendo and double entendres, influencing British comedy with his unique style and memorable catchphrases.
- Charles Manson's so-called "Family" carried out brutal murders, shocking America and cementing his name in criminal infamy despite never directly committing the killings.
- Charles Darwin spent over 20 years refining his theory of natural selection before publishing it, forever changing how we understand life on Earth.
- 10. The Hillsborough Disaster led to sweeping reforms in stadium safety and changed how police and emergency services handle large crowds.
- 11. Sid James was one of the most popular faces of British comedy, with his distinctive laugh and cheeky persona making him a Carry On films icon.
- 12. Picasso's Guernica became an international symbol of anti-war sentiment, capturing the horrors of the bombing and the suffering of innocent civilians.
