DID YOU KNOW?

- Margaret Mead was one of the most influential cultural anthropologists of the 20th century; her conversation with Baldwin in A Rap on Race remains a landmark on race relations.
- 2. Germaine Greer's The Female Eunuch (1970) challenged traditional gender roles and became a foundational feminist text.
- 3. In Just Getting Started, Justin Bieber reflects on his life in the spotlight, released at the peak of his early fame.
- Hans Christian Andersen's The Little Match Girl is one of his most poignant fairy tales, known for its social commentary on poverty.
- Rikki-Tikki-Tavi, a fearless mongoose, is one of the best-loved characters from Kipling's The Jungle Book.
- Walt Whitman self-published Leaves of Grass in 1855, and it became a defining work of American poetry and transcendental thought.
- 7. A traditional haiku consists of just three lines, typically with a 5-7-5 syllable pattern.
- Herbert Pocket becomes Pip's closest friend and mentor figure in Great Expectations, helping him adjust to life in London.
- Stardust, one of Neil Gaiman's most beloved novels, blends fantasy and folklore, later adapted into a hit film in 2007.
- Rudyard Kipling's Just So Stories use playful myth-making to explain animal traits, like "How the Camel Got His Hump."
- Sue Townsend's Adrian Mole series hilariously captures the thoughts and struggles of a socially awkward British teenager.
- 12. Horace Walpole, author of The Castle of Otranto, built Strawberry Hill House, a Gothic masterpiece that inspired Gothic literature.
