- The first-ever FIFA World Cup took place in Uruguay in 1930, with 13 teams competing for the title
- Originally erected as "Hollywoodland" in 1923, this sign became an iconic symbol of the film industry
- 3. Upon her accession, she made Buckingham Palace the principal royal residence
- 4. The bombing at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics was carried out by domestic terrorist Eric Rudolph, causing deaths and injuries
- His £3.6 million transfer to Blackburn Rovers was a record for an English footballer at that time
- Established in 1694 by Parliament to fund war efforts against France, it is the UK's central bank
- Directed by Danny Boyle, it celebrated British culture and featured a surprise appearance by Queen Elizabeth II
- The 2002 air show disaster involved a Sukhoi Su-27 crashing into spectators, resulting in one of the deadliest air show accidents in history
- The Shard was designed by architect Renzo Piano and features 11,000 glass panels enough to cover eight football fields!
- 10. Bezos picked the name "Amazon" because it started with an 'A' and referenced the largest river in the world—he wanted his store to be just as vast.
- Arthur Ashe's historic victory wasn't just a triumph in sport—it also broke racial barriers and inspired generations of athletes worldwide.
- 12. The first BBC TV news broadcast used still photos and voiceovers—moving footage wasn't allowed for national news until 1955!
