#### DID YOU KNOW

- Ray Reardon won the World Snooker
   Championship six times during the 1970s and
   was the oldest world champion at age 45 in 1978.
   He also played a key role in mentoring Ronnie
   O'Sullivan early in his career, helping him win the
   2004 World Championship.
- 2. Mel Smith co-founded Talkback Productions, which produced iconic British comedies like Da Ali G Show and I'm Alan Partridge. The company was sold in 2000 for a reported £62 million. Smith also directed Bean (1997), the globally successful Rowan Atkinson film that earned over \$245 million at the box office.
- Jeffrey Archer, known for bestselling novels like Kane and Abel, was convicted after lying under oath during a libel case. He served two years of his four-year sentence before being released early in 2003. Despite his conviction, he continued to write and publish novels after his release.
- The boycott led by the US saw over 60 countries refusing to participate in the 1980 Moscow Olympics, significantly reducing the number of competing athletes. In response, the Soviet Union and its allies boycotted the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.
- 5. The incident, often called the Chappaquiddick scandal, severely damaged Edward Kennedy's political career and raised questions about his potential run for the presidency. The event occurred on July 18, 1969, when Kennedy's car went off a bridge and into the water, tragically resulting in Kopechne's death.
- Sinéad O'Connor died at the age of 56. Despite personal struggles, she remained a powerful voice for social justice, mental health awareness, and spiritual exploration throughout her life.
- 7. Despite their separation, Elvis and Priscilla remained close, and Priscilla later played a key role in preserving Elvis's legacy through Graceland?
- Eva Perón died in July 1952 due to cancer.
  Despite her early death, she remains a beloved and influential figure in Argentina, known for championing labor rights and women's suffrage.
- The Potsdam Declaration was a statement from the Allied powers demanding Japan's unconditional surrender, warning of "prompt and utter destruction" if they refused—a key moment leading up to the end of World War II.
- 10. This 1745 match is one of the earliest recorded women's cricket games, showing that women have been involved in the sport for nearly three centuries!
- Sir Thomas Malory's Le Morte d'Arthur became one of the most influential works of Arthurian literature—even though he penned it while imprisoned for armed robbery and sexual assault.
- 12. Dr Crippen's capture in 1910 was the first criminal case solved using wireless telegraphy, as police radioed ahead to intercept his ship.
