#### DID YOU KNOW?

- Lester Piggott is one of the greatest jockeys in history but was convicted of tax evasion in 1987, leading to a three-year prison sentence.
- The Pacific Ocean covers more than 63 million square miles, making it the largest and deepest ocean on Earth.
- John Howard was an 18th-century English
   Quaker who revolutionized prison reform by
   advocating for paid jailers to reduce
   corruption.
- 4. Dr. James Blundell performed the first successful human-to-human blood transfusion in the 1820s, paving the way for modern transfusion medicine.
- The rank of Brigadier is just above Colonel and is the lowest general officer rank in the British Army.
- 6. Sebastian Coe dominated middle-distance running, winning Olympic gold medals and setting several world records in the late 1970s and early 1980s.
- Henry Shrapnel invented the shrapnel shell, an anti-personnel artillery projectile, which greatly influenced modern warfare.
- Blackpool Tower stands 518 feet tall and has been a prominent UK landmark since its opening in 1894, inspired by Paris's Eiffel Tower.
- A light-year is about six trillion miles—the distance light travels in one year, roughly 5.88 trillion miles but rounded to six trillion for simplicity.
- 10. The bronze statue of Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens was commissioned by his creator J.M. Barrie in 1912. It marks the spot where Peter "landed" in the story and was placed overnight without fanfare to surprise children.
- 11. In 1707, England and Scotland unified to form the Kingdom of Great Britain under the Act of Union. This marked the end of England as a separate sovereign state.
- 12. Charles became Prince of Wales at age 9 in 1958, though his formal investiture at Caernarfon Castle didn't occur until 1969, when he was 20. The title is traditionally granted to the heir apparent.
