- Bastet was originally a lioness warrior goddess but evolved into a gentler catheaded deity, revered as a protector of homes and pregnant women.
- The wyvern is often shown with a dragon's head, two legs, and a barbed tail, commonly used in medieval heraldry and fantasy literature.
- Emperor Claudius II reportedly executed Saint Valentine for secretly marrying couples, defying his military-focused edict.
- 4. Vampires were thought to fear garlic due to its purifying and protective properties in folklore, especially in Eastern Europe.
- The Minotaur lived in the Labyrinth on Crete, where Theseus used a ball of thread to find his way out after defeating the beast.
- 6. Lycanthropy is the mythical condition of turning into a wolf, inspiring countless werewolf legends throughout history.
- Janus was the Roman god of doorways, beginnings, and time—his two faces represent looking to the past and the future.
- 8. The Kraken is a legendary sea creature that sailors feared could drag entire ships underwater in Scandinavian folklore.
- The Leviathan, referenced in the Book of Job, symbolizes chaotic forces and is sometimes interpreted as a great sea serpent or dragon.
- Nemesis ensured that no one escaped justice, especially those who displayed arrogance before the gods (hubris).
- Ragnarök is the final battle in Norse mythology where gods like Odin and Thor perish, leading to the world's rebirth.
- 12. Thyestes' betrayal of his brother Atreus set off a legendary curse that haunted the House of Atreus for generations.
