- If The UK's first Women's Institute was founded in Anglesey during World War I, aiming to boost food production and empower rural women through community and education.

- 3. Turing the Cold War, an umbrella concealing a ricin-laced pellet injector was used in one of history's most mysterious and chilling assassinations.
