- Mx Mexico celebrates its independence on September 16, not May 5 (Cinco de Mayo), which actually commemorates a different battle against the French.
- In 1949, the pound was devalued by 30% to boost exports after World War II, a strategy later mirrored by several Commonwealth nations facing economic strain.
- Jag Hammarskjöld, the second Secretary-General of the United Nations, was posthumously awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1961.

  Jimi Hendrix died at 27, joining the infamous "27 Club", a group of legendary musicians who passed away at the same young age.
- France's last execution by guillotine took place in 1977, with the death penalty abolished in 1981 under then-Justice Minister Robert Badinter.
- The Saffron Revolution gets its name from the color of monks' robes; their peaceful protests were met with a brutal crackdown by the military junta.
- 7. The Scottish independence referendum had a record-high voter turnout of 84.6%, highlighting the depth of public engagement with the issue.
- Same Maggie Smith won two
   Academy Awards and five BAFTAs during
   her career, and once joked she had never
   watched a single episode of Downton
   Abbey, despite starring in it.
- Sam Allardyce's tenure as England manager lasted just 67 days, making it the shortest in the national team's history.
- 10. If Phil Spector pioneered the famous "Wall of Sound" production technique, revolutionizing pop music in the 1960s.
- 11. Cracker won the BAFTA for Best
  Drama Series and helped launch Robbie
  Coltrane to international fame long before
  he became Hagrid in Harry Potter.
- 12. Sen Johnson tested positive for stanozolol, a banned anabolic steroid, in one of the most shocking moments in Olympic history.
