Practice with a longbow A plastic hammer 	 This medieval law dates back to Edward III's reign — archery practice was mandatory to keep men prepared for battle, especially with the longbow, a key weapon in English warfare.

Eyebrows	 Plastic hammers are now a beloved (and harmless) tradition in the São João Festival, where revelers bop each other in celebration. The festival dates back to ancient midsummer traditions.
