- 9. Which Christian festival is celebrated annually on 29 September?
- 10. Which boxer did Tyson Fury defeat in October 2021 to retain his WBC heavyweight titles?
- 11. Which version of Windows was released in November 1985?
- 12. Fire crews raced to which tourist attraction after reports that the structure was on fire in December 2023, only for the blaze to turn out to be orange netting blowing in the wind?

- Al Capone the notorious Prohibition-era gangster, suffered from advanced syphilis after his release from prison and died of heart failure in 1947.
- 2. Afghanistan Prince Harry served as a forward air controller in Helmand Province. His deployment was kept secret for ten weeks by a media blackout agreement until it was leaked by foreign media.
- 3. **Captain Robert Falcon Scott** The British explorer led a doomed expedition to the South Pole. His final diary entries are among the most poignant in exploration history.
- 4. Motorbikes In April 1921, police officers in the UK began using motorbikes for the first time on the streets of London. This innovation improved response times and marked a new era in police mobility.
- 5. **All English Clubs** After the Heysel Stadium disaster during the European Cup Final between Liverpool and Juventus, the Football Association banned all English clubs from European competition. Liverpool received an extended ban beyond the general suspension.
- 7. Olivia Smith transferred from Liverpool to Arsenal for £1 million—setting a new world record in the women's game.
- 8. **The Twin Towers of the World Trade Center** Petit's high-wire act was unauthorized and took six years to plan. His performance was later turned into a documentary and a feature film.
- 9. **Michaelmas** also known as the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, was once one of the quarter days in the UK—traditionally when rents were due, and servants were hired. It also marked the end of the harvest season in medieval times.
- 10. **Deontay Wilder** Tyson Fury and Deontay Wilder's 2021 bout was their third and final fight in a dramatic trilogy. Fury won by 11th-round knockout in what's considered one of the greatest heavyweight fights of the modern era.
- 11. Windows 1.0 was the very first version of Microsoft Windows, marking the start of the Windows era.
- 12. Blackpool Tower In December 2023, fire crews rushed to Blackpool Tower, one of Britain's most iconic landmarks, after reports of a fire—but it turned out the 'flames' were just orange netting fluttering in the wind.

- 7. **The Earl of Grantham, Robert Crawley** Lord Grantham's dogs, Isis and Pharaoh, featured regularly in Downton Abbey, with Isis being quietly written out due to the name's later political associations.
- 8. The Winchester Club Arthur Daley's favourite pub and the setting for many of his schemes in Minder.
- 9. Danebury a fictional town in Essex that perfectly captures the peaceful countryside vibe in Detectorists.
- 10. Worbot a quirky robotic garden helper in Vengeance Most Fowl, showcasing Wallace & Gromit's signature blend of inventive gadgets and humour.
- 11. 👔 Sarah Michelle Gellar became a cultural icon playing Buffy, the vampire slayer who fought evil while navigating teen life.

- 1. A Soviet Journalist The nickname "Iron Lady" was coined by Soviet journalist Yuri Gavrilov in 1976 to criticize Thatcher's tough stance against the USSR. Thatcher embraced the title as a symbol of strength.
- 2. 📵 1863 The Metropolitan Railway, was the world's first underground railway, running between Paddington and Farringdon.
- 3. 1935 Although the Motor Car Act 1903 introduced licensing, it wasn't until 1935 that driving licences became compulsory for all UK drivers.
- 4. **years** King George III was declared unfit to rule in 1811 due to mental illness, leading to the Regency period under his son, which lasted about 9 years until George's death in 1820.
- 5. **Everton Toffee** Molly Bushell was a 19th-century sweet maker famous for Everton Toffee, a traditional hard toffee sweet originating from Liverpool.
- 6. **Institute** 151 The number of active Scotch whisky distilleries in Scotland continues to grow, reaching approximately 151 in 2025 due to increasing global demand and new distillery openings.
- 7. **1869** Mendeleev's periodic table organized elements by atomic weight and properties, predicting undiscovered elements with remarkable accuracy.
- 8. 🛖 Neighbours helped launch the careers of stars like Kylie Minoque, Guy Pearce, and Margot Robbie.
- 9. **St. Bernard** famous for their historical role as rescue dogs in the Swiss Alps—and their huge size and gentle temperament make them perfect for films.
- 10. Some Like It Hot This iconic line was a last-minute addition by writer-director Billy Wilder and has since become one of the most quoted lines in film history.
- 11. 🍿 Bath home to some of the best-preserved Roman baths in the world, which can still be visited today.
- 12. **Monty Python and the Holy Grail** The film was made on a shoestring budget, and many scenes were shot in the same few locations in Scotland with reused props.

- 1. **Strop** Barbers use a leather strop to realign and polish the edge of a razor blade, keeping it sharp and ready for a smooth shave.
- 2. **By The Way** "BT DUBS" is a playful way to say "By The Way," combining the initials BT and the pronunciation of W ("double-υ").
- 3. 📈 1st Duke of Wellington defeated Napoleon at the Battle of Waterloo in 1815, cementing his place in British history.
- 4. Thames The Queen Elizabeth II Bridge is part of the Dartford Crossing, connecting Essex and Kent over the Thames.
- 5. Wear-Earth Objects (NEOs) eg asteroids/comets The Torino Scale helps scientists communicate the risk level of asteroid or comet impacts on Earth, ranging from o (no risk) to 10 (certain collision).
- 6. **Copper and sometimes Silver** The copper in rose gold gives it a distinctive warm, pinkish hue that has made it popular in jewelry.
- 7. **The Mayor of New York City** Gracie Mansion has been the official mayoral residence since 1942 and is located in Manhattan's Carl Schurz Park.
- 8. 🕏 Stalin his adopted surname means "man of steel" in Russian, reflecting his image as a strong leader.
- 9. 🎤 Three ABBA's (Agnetha, Björn and Benny) Anni-Frid was born in Norway; the other three members were born in Sweden.
- 10. **§ Jaundice** occurs when excess bilirubin builds up in the body, often signaling liver problems like hepatitis.
- 11. 📜 Pooh-Bah holds multiple offices and titles in The Mikado, earning him the humorous title "Lord High Everything Else."
- 12. 🐣 Nuremberg hosts one of the world's largest toy fairs and has a centuries-old tradition of toy manufacturing.
