1. Jeff Goldblum spent hours in the makeup chair every day, with the creature effects becoming more elaborate as his character's body deteriorated throughout filming
2. The hide-and-clap scene wasn't in the original script. It became one of the film's most iconic moments after director James Wan refined it during production
3. The legend was inspired by the real-life folklore surrounding the Tooth Fairy—but with a horrifying twist that probably ruined bedtime for a generation!
4. The film's shocking final image was achieved using a body double wearing a lifelike mask, creating one of horror cinema's most unforgettable endings
5. The fictional band never actually appears on screen, but their concert is the catalyst that sets the film's horrifying chain of events in motion
6. The cheeseburger scene became so popular that many viewers left the cinema craving one—even though they'd just watched one of the darkest horror satires ever made!
7. Several nearly identical Ford Pintos were destroyed during filming, while others had their roofs removed so cameras could capture the claustrophobic scenes inside
8. The actor was deliberately kept separate from much of the cast before the big reveal, helping the betrayal feel like a genuine shock
9. The iconic Monster makeup took around four hours to apply, yet the character speaks fewer than 50 words across all of the classic film appearances
10. The entity never runs—it simply keeps walking. That slow, unstoppable pursuit is exactly what makes it so terrifying
11. The demon's striking red-and-black appearance was inspired by Darth Maul from *Star Wars*, although its behaviour is considerably more nightmarish
12. Gregory Peck accepted the role partly because he needed a hit after a string of box-office disappointments. The film went on to become one of the biggest horror successes of the 1970s
